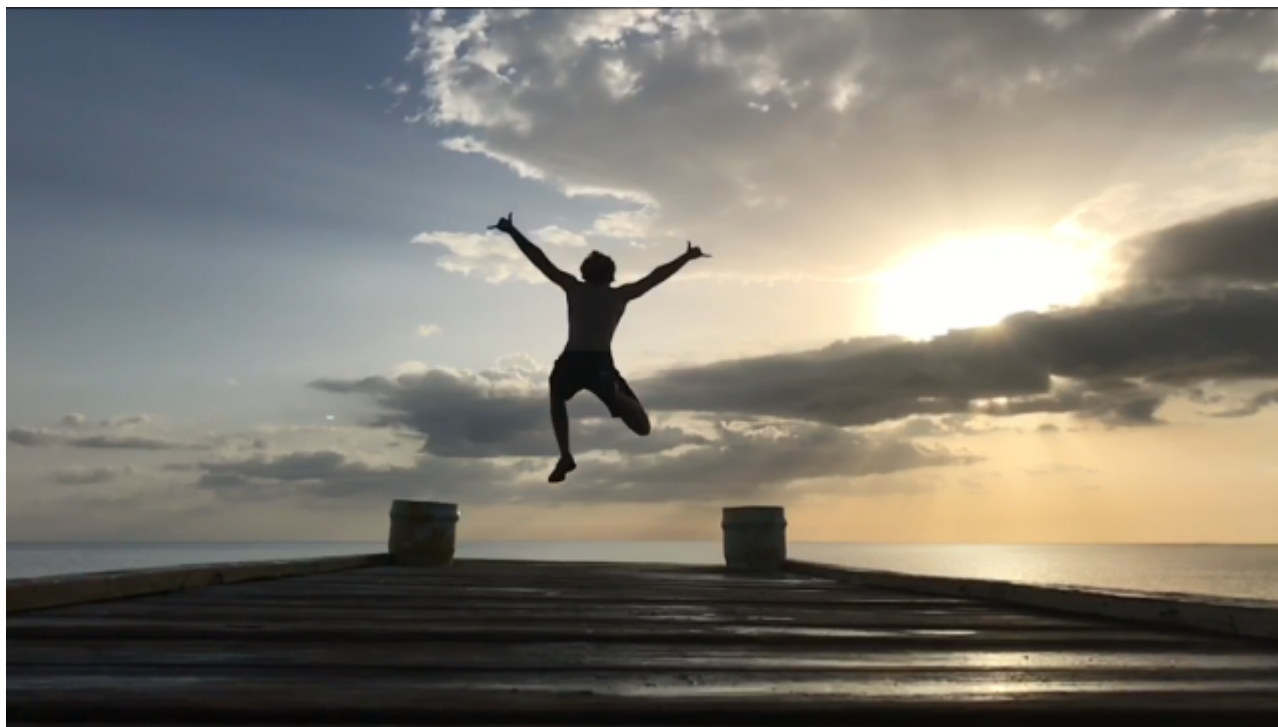
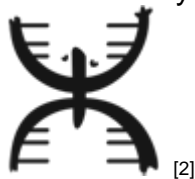


# Jumping into a Summer of New Experiences
